



William Frantz School – Site of integration of Ruby Bridges into New Orleans Public Schools is 5 blocks from dumpster site









Debris has not been picked up in months






Community driven change














Chain Link Fence removed



Chain link fences are unsightly if unnecessary. Removing them breaks down physical and psychological barriers in the community.




Building participation in community change
